## Chart Comparing Rules 1.7, 1.9, and 1.18

Here are key differences among the conflict protections for current, former and prospective clients:

A conflict exists for a lawyer where:  The representations of two concurrent clients are directly adverse, or there is a significant risk that the representation of one client will materially limit the lawyer's responsibilities to the other client.	<ul> <li>A conflict exists for a lawyer where:</li> <li>1. Representation of a person is in the same matter, or in a substantially related matter, as a former client's matter; and,</li> <li>2. The interests of the person and the former client in the matter are materially adverse.</li> </ul>	<ol> <li>A conflict exists for a lawyer where:</li> <li>A client has interests materially adverse to those of a prospective client in the same or a substantially related matter; and,</li> <li>The lawyer received information from the prospective client that could be significantly harmful to the prospective client in the matter.</li> </ol>
